ABSENCE AND ILLNESS

Individuals should not attend school if they feel unwell.

The main symptoms of Coronavirus (Covid-19) are a high temperature, a new, continuous cough and a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste.

If your child is absent from school it is important that the office is contacted on the morning of absence before 9:15am if possible. This procedure is in place for the safety and security of pupils. You will receive a telephone call or text message if no call is received. Please inform the school office as soon as possible if your mobile telephone number changes. Thank you.

PICK UP / DROP OFF

Parents / carers should avoid coming into the school grounds unless it is essential. Can you please drop your child off at the school gate no earlier than 9.10am for a 9.15am start. We would ask that parents maintain the 2m distance between families while waiting at the school gate for your child at 3.30pm.

SCHOOL LUNCHES

WATER & SNACKS

We are a health promoting school. Guidance regarding healthy eating in schools came into effect in April 2021, and the regulations apply across the whole school day.

Only the following drinks can be provided at any time of the primary school day:

Plain still or sparkling water Plain lower fat milk

Plain, lower fat, calcium enriched milk alternatives

No added sugar, lower fat milk drinks

No added sugar, lower fat drinking yoghurt

LAST TERM

TRIP TO IONA

On Thursday 28th October 2021, as part of our work this term learning about St Columba and Christianity, we visited Iona to spend time at the Abbey. After a long drive from school, and an exhilarating ferry crossing, we landed on Iona.



'I enjoyed the boat because I liked how it was bumpy.' Isla.

First, we walked through the old nunnery and looked at some of the ruins and graves. Some of the girls noticed that there were many crosses and decided to count them throughout the day.



In a small chapel, some of us lit candles to remember loved ones. We found the grave of the politician John Smith buried on Iona, along with the graves of many kings, Lords, clan chiefs as well as some local island residents.

'When we got there we went to the abbey and saw the graveyards. I feel bad for the people that did good things.' Leo.

On our walk to the abbey, we passed the 'Rest and Remember' bench. Some of us had been to Iona before, and sat down to remember our previous visits; for others it was our first time on Iona. Then we arrived at the abbey, where we each borrowed audio guides to tell us interesting facts along the way.



We climbed to the top of a mound in front of the abbey and saw the Street of the Dead.

'The abbey was awesome and we borrowed some audio guides.' Hannah. 'We carried speakers and we put in numbers to tell us what we saw.' Tyler.

We had our lunch in the cloisters surrounded by the arches with their beautiful carvings of plants and birds.



At the centre is an amazing sculpture by Jacob Lipchitz called Descent of the Spirit, which we sat around.



Finally we visited the small museum where there were many crosses, stone carvings and grave slabs and then onto St Oran's Chapel. We headed back to wait for the ferry for our journey back school.

'I saw lots and lots of crosses.' Mya. We all really enjoyed our school trip and are grateful to Mr Muchall for helping to organise it for us. The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child

Article 2 (non-discrimination) The Convention applies to every child without discrimination, whatever their ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status, whatever they think or say, whatever their family background.

Article 14 (freedom of thought, belief and religion) Every child has the right to think and believe what they choose and also to practise their religion, as long as they are not stopping other people from enjoying their rights. Governments must respect the rights and responsibilities of parents to guide their child as they grow up.

Article 28 (right to education) Every child has the right to an education. Primary education must be free and different forms of secondary education must be available to every child. Discipline in schools must respect children's dignity and their rights. Richer countries must help poorer countries achieve this.

Article 29 (goals of education) Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures, and the environment.

Article 30 (children from minority or indigenous groups) Every child has the right to learn and use the language, customs and religion of their family, whether or not these are shared by the majority of the people in the country where they live.

ST ANDREW'S DAY LUNCH

On Tuesday 30th November we celebrated Saint Andrew's Day at school. We learned about who Saint Andrew was and enjoyed a tasty 'Feast of Saint Andrew' at lunch time. Thank you to Flora Corbett for generously donating the lamb mince, and thank you to Miss Helen who turned into a yummy Shepherd's Pie.



RECYCLING BOTTLE TOPS

Our pupils have been bringing in bags of plastic bottle tops to add to our collection to be recycled to make money for guide dogs for the blind.



If anybody has any bottle tops at home or is able to start collecting them, we would really appreciate it. Ask your friends and neighbours too. The plastic milk bottle tops are collected in bulk and some recycling centres will pay charities for the plastic, which is worth more than other types of plastic. The funds raised are used by our chosen charity to train guide dogs for the blind.

As part of our eco-schools work, we are aiming to reduce the amount of plastic we use and recycle more. This will help us towards gaining our Green Flag award.

The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child

Article 23 (children with a disability): A child with a disability has the right to live a full and decent life with dignity and, as far as possible, independence and to play an active part in the community. Governments must do all they can to support disabled children and their families.

Article 24 (health and health services): Every child has the right to the best possible health. Governments must provide good quality health care, clean water, nutritious food, and a clean environment and education on health and well-being so that children can stay healthy. Richer countries must help poorer countries achieve this.

Article 29 (goals of education): Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage the child's respect for human rights, as well as respect for their parents, their own and other cultures, and the environment.

TREE PLANTING

In September, we embarked on our Green Tree Schools Award with The Woodland Trust. We have been making regular visits to Ardura Forest with Miss French, but this time she visited us at school for a very special reason. Our free tree pack from The Woodland Trust arrived and Miss French and Jan Dunlop came to help us to decide where to plant them and to help each one of us plant our own tree at school.



All of the trees are native species, grown in the UK; a mixture of crab apple, rowan and hazel. First, we completed the online Trees for Schools planting tool to help us decide where to plant, taking into consideration other trees and plants already in our garden, areas of tarmac, our conservation garden and pond and the shed. It showed us what it might look like in 20 years.



As well as earning us two points for our Green Trees School Award, planting our trees is part of the Queen's Green Canopy to mark The Platinum Jubilee of Elizabeth II to plant a network across the UK and a

green legacy in honour of The Queen's service.

Our efforts also count towards the Big Climate Fightback, an initiative to get the UK involved in planting 50 million trees to help combat the climate crisis.

All of the children at Lochdonhead Primary think that trees are important because they create homes and food for wildlife, they make our grounds look nice, they clean the air we breathe and absorb carbon dioxide.

We look forward to seeing them grow!

Tree dressing is celebrated in different cultures all over the world. It's a tradition that brings people closer to trees and highlights the important role they play in our lives. It's also a great way of saying thank you to trees for all the benefits they provide.



Rachel French (MICT's Community Wellbeing Officer) came to school to help us learn about tree dressing and made some decorations to celebrate a special tree as part of Tree Dressing Day, which takes place in the first weekend of December. As it was close to Christmas, we all agreed to choose the Christmas tree

in Craignure so that we could add to our community Christmas display.

Rachel helped us to make a natural decorative garland by threading dried fruit, popcorn, dried fallen leaves, and wool pom-poms onto string, and each of us also made decorations from pine cones. It was important for us to use only natural materials so there was no threat to wildlife and no risk of littering. Lots of people came to see the tree over the festive period so we were proud of our contribution.

Completing the Tree Dressing Challenge has also earned us 2 points towards our Green Tree Schools Award!

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TREE HARVESTING

On the 18th November we were invited to Ardura Forest to see the tree felling in operation (from a very safe distance!) We saw the MASSIVE machine that is used to chop down and log the trees. We couldn't believe how fast it went through them.

The children will be learning basic first aid from a HeartStart trainer on Thursday 3rd February.


SWIMMING
